We also recognize that some of our schools are located on the traditional territories of the MÁLEXEŁ (Malahat) Nation, and the Lək wəŋən peoples of Songhees and Esquimalt Nations.

## Partner Groups

### Trustee - Chrstine Lervold

- Attended Parent Ed session held last week, thank you to SPEAC for putting that on.
- Strategic Plan is on SD62 website planned student voice and parent sessions coming up Great work happening around literacy and numeracy and engaging student and parent voice.
- Approval for the North Langford Secondary school. Discussed likely timeline at Resources meeting. Based on preliminary estimates, hoping for 2030.
- We are one of the few districts in the province continuing to grow year over year, so glad to
  get that funding. Submitted enrolment numbers as required at end of September to the ministry, showing growth of 365 students across the district.
- Discussed design standard for new schools going forward at the Resources meeting.
- Transit Victoria Regional Transit is hosting an Open House session tomorrow Oct 16 in Langford and Sooke to get engagement and feedback on BC Transit in our region

Q: With the growth, do we have a breakdown of how many are elementary/middle/secondary or which schools are4 growing the most?

A: Don't have that on hand yet; we will have it but do not have those numbers for this meeting. Last year growth was most rapid at the secondary level.

Q: Was the 365 growth at the new school?

A: No, the 365 Is across the district, SĆIANEW SŢEŁIŢĶEŁ is an overflow school that was opened due to high capacity at other previously existing schools.

#### Superintendent / Associate Superintendent – D'Arcy Deacon

- Reiterating Strategic Plan info mentioned above; Parent/Guardian Forum next week Oct 22<sup>nd</sup> at RBSS 6:30-8:00
- Presented 2025-26 Student Voice Engagement Plan
  - o Three goals: 1) Increase Student Participation in School Decision Making,
    - 2) Improve Student Perception of Being Heard and Respected, and
    - 3) Use Student Feedback to Inform School Improvement Planning
- Beginning to look at design process and looking for a Project Officer for the new North
  Langford Secondary. There is hope that this school will be open for the 2031 school
  year. Will be looking for parent and student consultation, though it is still early days at this
  point.

- Significant enrolment pressures, especially at the secondary level. While the announcement of the new school is positive news, we're still a few years away from it opening which means we still have pressures on space and classes in our schools. Looking into modifying the timetable into a 5-block day for secondary schools, sometimes called an "extended day". Some districts in lower mainland have done this, essentially you go to school for four blocks per day but there isn't enough space to hold all students in all classes, so we're just planning and exploring creating a timetable where there are five available blocks between 8am-4pm, but students would be scheduled into four blocks typically blocks 1-4 or 2-5 so that it reduces the volume of students in the building at any given time. This is a planning stage only, so that we have a plan should implementation become necessary.
- SD62 as a partner group alongside post-secondary institutions at the John Horgan Campus. The Fast Forward Graduation program (Adult Dogwood program) is hosted there, online and continuing ed departments, careers department, are also hosted there.

## Principals/Vice-Principals – Jen Gibson

- Just a note that Jen worked in the Surrey school district and we had to use the 5-block system way back several years ago and it was very favourable, would highly recommend.
- Please do get involved in the consultation processes across the district, you might not think it
  makes a big difference, but your voices and opinions and questions are really taken on board
  and considered.
- Keep lines of communication open between home and school and checking in with teachers etc, checking in on MyEdBC, etc
- Strategic Plan's focus on literacy and numeracy across the district starting right in kindergarten and how to support throughout all grades

## SD62 Committee Reports

- Education policy Meeting Ash Senini
  - o Last meeting on Oct 7<sup>th</sup>
  - o Denise Wehner presented K-12 Literacy Plan
  - Paul Block present review of new policies and regulations that will be made to the Board including a Draft Revised Policy and Regulations C-314 "Substance Use Prevention and Intervention" and Draft New Policy F-499 "Unexpected Health Emergencies" which includes purchasing naloxone kits, AEDs, etc. and to have folks trained to use these.

- Resources Meeting Tom Davis
  - o Last meeting Oct 14th
  - Discussed newly approved North Langford Secondary (see other notes above) and design options that do not limit desired aspects such as natural light and overhangs to block rain etc.
  - o Enrolment numbers projected in Feb were just 0.07% over compared to final numbers at end of Sep. Slight pressure on our budget but overall was anticipated.
  - One of three districts in the province that is still growing, all other districts are either stagnant or seeing a decrease in enrolment.
- Board of Education Meeting Tom Davis
  - Last meeting on Sep 23<sup>rd</sup>
  - Several international field trips posed and approved. Some concerns voiced around travels planned to the U.S.
  - Several motions carried

## President's Report – Tom Davis

## Treasurer's Report – April Lagadyn

- Reminder: Gaming Grant applications should have been in by end of September and a
  confirmation should have been sent out. If PAC Treasurers need assistance, they can reach
  out to SPEAC
- \$25,597.94 in general account as of end of September
- \$341.57 in gaming account as of end of September
- Need another person for approximately 2hrs of time to review the financials for SPEAC last year (April can be one reviewer as she didn't do the Financials last year). Meghan Rownd volunteers, thank you!

Q: PAC was asked to fund audio-visual equipment that was fairly expensive. We thought it should be funded by the district itself. Wondering if this can fall under gaming grant, or if this is excluded from gaming use?

A: You can't use gaming grant money for physical equipment, and you cannot use a gaming grant to secure funds for that (such as raffles, 50/50, etc). Gaming specifically told our PAC that any school upgrades such as equipment, scoreboards, sound systems, etc, is considered an upgrade to the school and either needs to come from school district or fundraise separately for that. Additionally, if PAC buys something that is then owned by the school district, the district can do with it as they wish and could move the equipment out of the school in which the PAC fundraised for it. Not recommended.

### New Business – Tom Davis

Q: For overcrowding, specifically at Royal Bay, I read I think in Times Colonist that they were also considering using land purchased for an elementary school, is that right? A: It was suggested that the elementary school land, which is walkable distance from Royal Bay but the school build is not approved yet, could be used to put modular classrooms on as a satellite site for Royal Bay, but I don't think that was approved by the Province and isn't an ideal solution, just trying to think outside the box knowing the upcoming years will be very crowded.
